

What is a HBCU?

- Historically black colleges and universities are institutions of higher education in the United States that were established before the Civil Rights Act of 1964 with the intention of primarily serving the African-American community.
- Most of these institutions were founded in the years after the American Civil War and are concentrated in the Southern United States.
- During the period of segregation in the United States prior to the Civil Rights Act, the overwhelming majority of higher education institutions were predominantly white and completely disqualified or limited African-American enrollment.
- For a century after the end of slavery in the United States in 1865, most colleges and universities in the Southern United States prohibited all African Americans from attending, while institutions in other parts of the country regularly employed quotas to limit admissions of blacks.

Common Black College Application

The Common Black College Application allows students to submit a single application to all of our Participating Member Institutions for \$20, interact with school counselors, learn about HBCUs, and more to further your college preparation experience.



Practice Common Black College Application

The goal of the CBCA is to make applying to multiple colleges more affordable for lower-income families. While currently only about half of the HBCUs in the country accept the CBCA, the list of colleges is growing.

The Common Black College Application (CBCA) is a similar process to the Common Application (Common App) with some key features. Whereas most of the time you pay application fees to each college you submit an application to, the Common Black College App allows you to apply to all 53 HBCU who are members of the service for a minimal fee.

You can state preferences for which top four schools' interest you. But your application will be made available to all the other colleges. 25 of the member colleges are able to access your transcripts and test scores from EDU, Inc., although you'll have to fax or mail them into the company. The other 28 schools you will have to mail that information directly to the school itself.
