

April 9th TESTING

Dear Eppler Parents/Guardians,

All students will be testing on Tuesday, April 9, during 1st, 2nd, and 3rd hours. The 7th graders will be taking the M-STEP ELA, the 8th graders will be taking the PSAT 8/9, and the 9th graders will also be taking the PSAT 8/9.

Testing room assignments for Tuesday, April 9, are posted on the Cafeteria and Media Center windows. Students can check the lists to see where they should report for testing.

Testing will begin as soon as the first bell rings at 7:20am on that day so please make sure your child is on time and avoid early dismissals during 1, 2, and 3 hour. Students cannot stop testing in the middle of the test.

When students arrive on Tuesday, April 9, they will go to their locker to drop off their backpacks, coats, phones, smart watches, Air Pods, and any other personal items and report to their testing room. Per state testing guidelines, these items **ARE NOT** permitted in the testing areas to ensure students' scores are not compromised. *If students do not know their locker combination, they need to ask the office for it PRIOR to testing day.

On Wednesday, April 10, 7th and 8th grade students will be testing throughout the school day. 7th graders will be taking the M-STEP Math test in their math classes, 8th graders will be taking the M-STEP Science and Social Studies tests in their science and social studies classes and 9th graders will follow their normal schedule with no testing. For testing on this day, students will need their charged laptop, charging cord, and a writing utensil. Corded headphones or earbuds are optional. All other items, including cell phones, should be left in their locker before class.

Finally, some test preparation tips are listed below. Thank you for your support!

The Night Before Testing:

- Relax! You've got this! Practice the 5 Finger Breathing Exercise below.
- Hydrate and have a healthy dinner. Drink water and load up with complex carbohydrates...potatoes, pasta, and rice are good choices here, as well as protein and vegetables. Avoid junk food and sugary drinks.
- Organize your backpack for test day. The night before <u>put</u> items you will need for testing in your backpack. Double check that you have everything that you will need for testing.
- Make a plan to get to school on time. Before you go to sleep, make sure you set an alarm (or two). Consider picking out your clothes ahead of time as well.
- Get a good sleep. Try to get at least 8 hours of sleep the night before the test. Start by limiting screen time. You're going to need to get a good night's sleep, and bright screens (televisions, phones, movies) will wake up your brain and make it more difficult to drift off at an early hour.
- ✓ CHARGE YOUR COMPUTER!

On Test Morning:

- Have a healthy breakfast. Here are a few good choices: eggs, toast, cereal, bagel, fruit, juice, cheese, milk.
- Stick to your routine. If you don't drink a caffeinated beverage every day, test day isn't the time to start. You need calm, slow-burning, consistent energy today.
- ✓ DON'T FORGET YOUR LAPTOP AND CHARGING CORD!
- Be on time. Get to school early, if possible, to put your personal items in your locker and report to the testing room by 7:20am.
- Relax! You've got this! Use the 5 Finger Breathing Exercise you practiced if you get stressed!



If a student forgets their lunch, they may borrow against their lunch account in the cafeteria, or a parent may drop off a lunch for their

Student. nowever, if the food dropped off is from a restaurant, the student will be asked to eat it in the Main Office during their lunch hour. Coffee, smoothies, and outside breakfast brought in the school in the morning must be consumed before going into first hour. This is the practice that takes place at the high school level and Eppler is aligning with Utica High in order to provide consistent expectations for our students. 





RIVER DAY DESIGN CONTEST






Eppler Band






