SAT AND ACT TESTING

Students may also sign up to take the SAT on a National test date during the summer or fall. The test is available at multiple locations throughout Metro Detroit. Summer dates fill up quickly. Students can sign up to take the SAT on their own at: SAT Registration

The ACT is as valuable as the SAT. If you (your student) are planning on taking the ACT, sign up at ACTStudent.org Tests are offered at local high schools and colleges and students can select the location that is best for them. The ACT is readily accepted at all colleges and universities as an admissions test and used for scholarship purposes as well.

Spring SAT and PSAT Results

Students can log on to their Collegeboard accounts to view their results and most of the scores are already available. Score reports will not be mailed to the school. Eisenhower does not have access to a student's personal Collegeboard account login credentials. Students may contact Collegeboard directly if unable to access their account. Most students created their Collegeboard accounts using their UCS login. If that does not work, contact Collegeboard directly.

- The objective of our STW Program is to connect classroom learning with work-based learning experiences, prepare students for the move from classroom to the workplace, support supervised on-the-job training, and help students make career decisions.
- Our Students will:
 - Develop the essential skills and habits required in the workplace.
 - Receive a <u>GRADE</u> and <u>CREDIT</u> towards graduation for this full year course.
 - Gain valuable <u>PAID</u> work experience to help build a resume for post-secondary programs and future employment in a variety of career areas.

WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS?



GPA-2.0 Minimum



Attendance: Must be excellent at school; including tardies and unexcused absences from 9th grade and beyond.



Enrollment in a CTE Course concurrent with their internship placement(see courses listed on reverse side).



Students work 10 hours a week at minimum, 24 maximum per child labor laws. Must have reliable transportation and leave school after 5th hour.



Grades are based on: Student completed time books. Employer quarterly evaluations of the student and attendance at monthly meetings with coordinator.



Coordinators visit work sites to ensure a safe and productive training environment and build relationships with employers.

Timelines for High School Students

9th-graders

- Activity Log: Get involved in a couple of clubs, sports, or other extracurricular activities either at your school or in your local community. Keep track of your engagements on a simple spreadsheet.
- <u>Challenge yourself academically</u>: Take advantage of the course offerings and make a four-year plan that will make you stand out.
- How to study effectively: Improve your study skills and build new habits.
- Be careful with your social media use: Any words or pictures you post are part of your permanent online record. If it is something you would not want your grandparent to see, maybe do not post it.

10th-graders

- Study schedule: If you do not have a plan in place, now is a great time to create one.
- Consider taking the ACT or SAT as a practice test (Do NOT send scores to universities). These practice tests are a great way to get experience with the content and timing of standardized exams.
- Start exploring possible careers: There are so many possibilities out there. What sounds interesting
 to you? Start with your interests and see where your research takes you. Naviance is a great tool to
 research careers!

11th-graders

- Naviance: Check out this awesome resource that helps you figure out what you want (and do not want) from your college experience. Login through the icon in Class Link
- <u>Connect with college admission reps</u>: Sign up for a few sessions with college representatives either virtually or through campus visits.
- Prepare for standardized testing that occurs in your junior year. Although many schools are 'Test Optional', if you do well, it is to your advantage to use your score.

12th-graders

This is a critical time for seniors. By this point, you should have a close-to-final college list and be working on your college applications.

- <u>Letters of recommendation</u>: This is a good time to check in with your recommenders to make sure they know your deadlines. Not all schools require a letter of recommendation, but the ones that do typically want a strong letter from someone who can attest to your ability in the classroom.
- <u>College applications are live in August</u>: Start familiarizing yourself with the information you need to gather. Apply direct to the institution when this option is available, otherwise, apply through the Common Application.
- Writing your College Essays: Answer the question! This is the biggest mistake students make! If the question is asking WHY you choose that school, use this space to display your knowledge about the school, the opportunities they have for students and how you fit in. Answer the question!
- <u>FAFSA</u> + <u>CSS PROFILE</u>: These two forms are critical to your financial aid process. All schools require the FAFSA; the CSS PROFILE is only required by some schools and scholarships. Submission windows open on October 1st.
- <u>Connect with college admission reps</u>, either at school, online or in the community through college fairs. These sessions are important opportunities to let colleges know you are considering attending their institution, which, in some cases, can help your chances.
- <u>Create a spreadsheet of requirements and deadlines</u>: Keep track of application deadlines, number of required recommendation letters, scholarship deadlines, portfolio requirements, etc., all in one organized spot.

Post-secondary options include college (2 and 4 year), military, Trade schools and apprenticeship programs and entering the workforce. What is your plan?

College Application: Simple Steps

- Create a college list- list the colleges you will apply to and what the requirements are. A spreadsheet could help you organize this, along with the deadlines for each school
- Determine which application you should use and create accounts. Direct Application- apply to school using application on school's website (ALWAYS THE BEST OPTION). Common Application: www.commonapp.org
- Request transcripts- Parchment <u>www.parchment.com</u> (Information will be posted on UCS College Central)
 - www.uticak12.org/college_central
- Send Test Scores: If it is required or you would like to send your test score, you will need to send them using your College Board (<u>www.collegeboard.com</u>) or ACT (<u>www.actstudent.org</u>) account.
- Letters of Recommendation- If the school you are applying to requires this (from either a teacher or a counselor), please see fill out the Request for Letter of Recommendation Google form Request for Counselor Letter of Recommendation (google.com). Also found in Schoology College Information Folder. The more information you provide, the better!
- Submit your applications. Review your application to ensure you have completed all parts
 with accurate information. Ask your parents to assist you with this. Submit and pay for your
 applications. *** Your submission is independent of all other parts. Do not wait for transcripts or
 letters of recommendation if you are ready to submit. The receiving college will not mark your
 application as 'complete' until they have ALL the required components. ***

Common Application - Below is the full set of essay prompts for 2022-2023. Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story. Remember that the essay for the Common Application goes to ALL schools you are applying to through the common app and you should not direct this essay to any one school. You will likely have supplemental essays that are specific to each school you are applying to. It is so important to ANSWER THE PROMPT/QUESTION. When you are being compared to other applicants with the same rigor, same test scores, same activities, etc., it is the essay that will ultimately separate you from everyone else.

- 1. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- 2. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?
- 3. Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?
- 4. Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.
- 5. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?
- 6. Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you have already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.
